2019 Community Commitment Annual Report

The Community Commitment Program at Newport News Nuclear BWXT Los Alamos (N3B) grew by leaps and bounds in 2019. Though N3B's primary mission is to protect the environment and clean up legacy waste at Los Alamos National Laboratory, we also want to be a good corporate citizen and partner with local communities. Toward that end, N3B committed five percent of its fee over the life of the contract to two key funding elements: Northern New Mexico nonprofits and workforce development initiatives.

Even before beginning operations in April 2018, N3B's Board of Managers began making contributions to community non-profits. N3B provided nearly \$16,000 to support several local events before officially finalizing the framework for the Community Commitment Program and rolling it out to the public in June 2019.

To increase awareness of available funds, N3B held a community meeting at Fuller Lodge in Los Alamos on June 12, followed by a community meeting at The Misión Museum in Española on June 20. The Española and Los Alamos Chambers of Commerce were instrumental in promoting awareness of these meetings to their members. Increased visibility of the program also resulted from information on a new external website with criteria organizations need to meet to be considered for funds, along with how to access N3B funding.

Since we published our mid-year report in July 2019, the number of new nonprofits that applied for funding, and that N3B ultimately supported, grew by over 300 percent — from 11 organizations between January and June to 34 organizations from July to December. With \$415,000 in expenditures, we were able to expand our reach to serve a range of Northern New Mexico organizations offering key programs in diverse locations. Community Commitment dollars have also helped N3B increase awareness and transparency of its cleanup operations at Los Alamos National Laboratory, as we often participate in community events where N3B employees work and live.

In August 2019, we launched our first class of the Nuclear Operators Apprenticeship Program – currently the main component of our workforce development initiative. Three months later, the initiative was recognized by the State of New Mexico as a registered apprentice program, which made substantial federal and state resources available to the program and the students. Graduates receive nationally recognized industry credentials, along with the potential for federal assistance such as tuition support and tax credits.





2019 Program Accomplishments

- As a result of public outreach efforts, which included the launch of a page on our external website and support from local chambers of commerce, the number and diversity of organizations that sought us out and that we donated to expanded significantly in the latter part of 2019. These efforts allowed us to provide broader outreach to the community.
- From July through December, our Community Commitment Program received more than 50 new requests from across Northern New Mexico. Thirty-six requests were granted — 34 of which were from new organizations, an increase of over 300 percent compared to the first six months of 2019.



Community Contribution Guidelines

Newport News Nuclear BWXT Los Alamos (N3B) is committed to providing five percent of its earned fee over the life of the Los Alamos Legacy Cleanup Contract to benefit community organizations in Northern New Mexico. The majority of these funds are designated toward education initiatives and economic and charitable giving that will have the greatest impact on the region.

As part of N3B's wider Community Outreach Effort, we have established a community contribution program to provide financial support to local organizations. We are soliciting Northern New Mexico nonprofit organizations to submit funding requests in the following areas:

Education

Health & Human Services
Arts & Culture

Civic & Economic Development

Financial support is provided to nonprofit organizations that have a 501(c)3 or 170(c) tax-exempt status. Requests will be evaluated based, in part, on the following:

- Orientation toward STEM education Ability to address the needs of underserved populations
- Ability to serve the most people possible Sponsorship by organizations in which N3B employees and their families
- participate Demonstration of a genuine community need with limited options for alternate
- funding Ability to provide recognition for N3B, as well as its community partners and partnerships

On occasion, N3B will consider requests from community organizations that fall outside the screening criteria if the projects reflect N3B's mission, values and interests, and especially if they contribute to improved communitywide quality of life and promote economic development in Northern New Mexico.

N3B Community Contributions Frequently Asked Questions

What is your funding cycle? Our funding cycle is January 1–December 31. However, requests for funding may be submitted at any time.

When is the best time to submit a request? The best time to submit a request is when you have a proposal that meets the guidelines and answers any questions you think we may have about your program.

What is the minimum and maximum dollar amount that you will grant per project? We have not set a minimum or maximum dollar amount. But typically we expect the minimum will be about \$500 and the maximum to be in the \$5,000-\$10,000 range.

What about the maximum per organization? We have not set a maximum per organization. However, given the need, we would be less likely to fund an additional request from an organization that has received funds from us in the preceding 12 months.

How much money do you anticipate awarding in a year? N3B has committed to giving away five

N3B has committed to giving away five percent of its annual earned fee, which can vary from year to year. In 2019, our budget for the community contribution portion of our Community Commitment Plan is about \$267,000. The Apprenticeship Program additionally has budgeted for \$133,000. The full Community Commitment budget is at \$400,000.

What types of projects will you fund? Funding guidelines can be found on our website at www.n3b-la.com. In general we have targeted our funding according to the following breakdown: Education – 50 percent

- Education 50 percent
 Arts & Culture 20 percent
 Health & Human Services 20 percent
- Civic & Economic Development 10
 percent

Do you think your funding priorities will change? We will review our program periodically along

We will review our program periodically along with the types of requests we receive. It's quite possible we will make changes if we see important community needs that don't match with our listed priorities.

Will requests be categorized by type of

organization or type of project? Most requests will be coded by organization. However, it is quite conceivable for an arts organization, for example, to submit a request for funding for an educational program. In that case, it would be coded toward education.

2019 Workforce Development Initiative

In 2019, one-fifth of N3B's Community Commitment funds were spent on the **Nuclear Operators Apprenticeship Program** — a two-year workforce development initiative modeled on the highly successful Apprentice School at Huntington Ingalls Industries, one of N3B's parent companies.

In August 2019, the maxiumum of five students were enrolled in the inaugural N3B Apprenticeship Program at Northern New Mexico College in Española with a graduation date of July 2021. In addition to having tuition expenses reimbursed, students are paid a 40-hour-per week salary while they are students. Upon successful completion of the program, they are offered full-time employment at N3B as nuclear operators with a comprehensive benefits package and a matching 401(k) retirement savings account.

The program develops a local workforce that is prepared to properly handle, package, treat and document hazardous and radioactive waste.

In 2019, N3B contributed to the following grant-funded programs at 33 Northern New Mexico nonprofits, or organizations with a 501(c) or 170(c) tax-exempt status. 100 Men Who Care Los Alamos

100 Men Who Care Los Alamos supports local charities and nonprofits dedicated to

making a difference in our community. The organization multiplies members' individual impacts by supporting under-resourced entities. N3B contributed funds to support the organization's mission of encouraging



philanthropy among men in Los Alamos County.

Boys & Girls Clubs of Santa Fe/Del Norte

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Santa Fe/Del Norte helps enable all young people to reach their full potential — especially at-risk children, ages 5-18, from low-income neighborhoods in Santa Fe and Rio Arriba counties. Over 700 children per year benefit from the clubs, which are located in neighborhoods where quality after-school and summer programming is limited or unavailable. N3B's donation will go toward their Diplomas to

Degrees Program, a college readiness program that helps guide teens as they work toward high school graduation, college and a career.



Services include coordination of college tours and assistance in securing financial aid.

Bradbury Science Museum Association

The Bradbury Science Museum Association supports the Bradbury Science Museum's educational mission to promote STEM learning and scientific literacy for people of all ages. They

provide workshops, field trips, special events and support for museum and community educators. N3B's contribution funds



stipends for museum educators, educational materials and venue rental for a theater troupe that encourages Northern New Mexico students to get engaged in fields related to Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics (STEAM).

Breath of My Heart Birthplace

Breath of My Heart Birthplace is an Española Valley no-cost, walk-in prenatal clinic that strives to improve access to quality prenatal care, as well as maternal and infant health outcomes, in rural communities of Northern New Mexico. The clinic acts as a vital resource in a region with an extreme shortage of maternity providers and widespread underinsurance. N3B's contribution will help with

general operation of the clinic, which offers free pregnancy tests, prenatal care, postpartum care, annual exams, newborn care and lactation consulting.

Dance Arts Los Alamos


Dance Arts Los Alamos (DALA) promotes dance in Northern New Mexico by providing safe, professional instruction and quality performances. They offer 75-80 dance classes per week with an average of 5-12 students — from adults to children as young as two years old. N3B's donation will contribute to a major upgrade to DALA facilities and will allow the organization to replace and expand its floor-to-ceiling dance mirrors.



Española Community Market Cooperative

The Española Community Market Cooperative operates a self-sustainable public market that offers locally grown fruits and vegetables, along

with organic dairy products, meats, bulk grains and baked goods, to people in the Española Valley. N3B donated funds that allow a 50-percent discount on locally grown fruits and vegetables to Rio Arriba County families who receive assistance from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, previously known as the Food Stamp Program.



The Family YMCA Española YMCA Teen Center

The Family YMCA, located in Los Alamos, was established in 1955 and strives to enhance the community through leadership development, service-learning, community interaction, healthy life choices and active lifestyles. In 2007, city leaders in the neighboring town of Española requested a YMCA Teen Center for engaging community youth in healthy activities. N3B funds will support afterschool tutoring and enrichment programs for more than 700 youth annually at the Española YMCA Teen Center.

Habitat for Humanity of Española Valley and Los Alamos

Habitat for Humanity strives to build healthy communities by partnering with low-to-middle income residents to build or improve their homes. Homeowners work alongside Habitat volunteers and re-pay Habitat for the land and cost to build with a zero-percent interest, 30-year mortgage. N3B's contribution helped the organization pay for installation of septic and water systems at six homes in a residential area for underserved families in Española.



Healing America's Heroes

Healing America's Heroes provides alternative methods of healing to combat veterans and active duty service members who suffer from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, Military Sexual

Trauma or Traumatic Brain Injury. N3B's contribution will support specific healing methods that include outdoor recreational therapies



revolving around horseback riding and fly fishing, which promote meditative mindsets and the concept of health and lifetime fitness.

Las Cumbres Community Services

Las Cumbres Community Services, one of the largest social service providers in New Mexico, offers services such as day habilitation for adults with developmental disabilities and therapeutic preschool to children in the Española Valley. Their offices are located throughout Northern New Mexico. N3B's contribution will help eliminate barriers to education for students, and members of their families, who are enrolled in the N3B and Northern New Mexico Nuclear Operators Apprenticeship Program.



Literacy Volunteers of Santa Fe

The Literacy Volunteers of Santa Fe — the only free adult literacy and English as a Second Language

program in Santa Fe County
offers tutoring services
to adults, the majority of
whom read at a sixth-grade
level or below. Tutors also
work with non-English
speakers on communication
skills to ease workplace
and daily life struggles.
N3B's contribution will help
secure program funding
and maintain support of the
program's 400 students.

Los Alamos Community Foundation

The Los Alamos Community Foundation (LACF) works to improve the quality of life of Los Alamos residents by inspiring, facilitating and supporting enduring philanthropy, and by building the capacity and success of local nonprofit organizations. N3B gave funds to establish a Nonprofit Sustainability Project for designed to help nonprofit organizations improve their financial sustainability through endowments.



Los Alamos Family Council

The Los Alamos Family Council (LAFC) serves families in Los Alamos County by promoting emotional and social well-being through advocacy, education and counseling. Their two primary programs are the only nonprofit counseling centers in the county. The two Youth Activity Centers in Los Alamos and White Rock

provide free after-school activities for students in grades 3-8. N3B's donation will allow LAFC to offer a weekly STEM activity



and hire tutors to assist students with homework.

Los Alamos Historical Society

The Los Alamos Historical Society works to preserve, promote and communicate the history

and stories of Los Alamos and its people for local and global audiences and future generations. N3B funds will be used to translate, create and print museum brochures into



Spanish in partnership with the University of New Mexico-Los Alamos.

Los Alamos Juvenile Justice Advisory Board

The Los Alamos Juvenile Justice Advisory Board (JJAB) offers families and youth individualized case management assistance, parenting workshops, youth activities and free classes and training on issues such as intervention and prevention. N3B contributed to JJAB's 2019 Girls Discovery Workshop, which connects young girls with female role models. Girls are mentored to develop their unique strengths, define their goals and connect with other girls and community leaders to envision and work toward a positive future.

Los Alamos Makers

Los Alamos Makers is a vocational training center for all ages and abilities that focuses on STEAM-related fields. Their mission is to foster a community of learners and doers by encouraging professional development, creativity, perseverance and ingenuity at any age. N3B's funds will help the organization pilot a Biotechnology Club to introduce community members to fields such as biotechnology, environmental biology and bioinformatics. The club will also support a local biodiversity DNA barcoding community project.



Los Alamos National Laboratory Major Subcontractors Consortium

The Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL) Major Subcontractors Consortium is a collaboration of LANL major subcontractors with the goal of strategically aligning and pooling resources in support of education, economic development and community giving initiatives in Northern New

Mexico. N3B contributed funds to the consortium's grant pool to support those initiatives in the counties of Rio Arriba, Los Alamos, Mora, San Miguel, Sandoval, Santa Fe and Taos, as well as the pueblos in those counties.





Los Alamos Public Schools Foundation

The Los Alamos Public Schools Foundation raises funds to promote innovative learning in Los Alamos public schools. N3B committed funds to assist Los Alamos Middle School in creating an Innovation Program. Funds will help with purchasing

materials and resources for more handson STEM



activities, in addition to teacher training.

National Dance Institute of New Mexico

The National Dance Institute of New Mexico operates under the notion that the arts have a unique power to engage and motivate children. They



carry out programs that help about 8,400 children a year from low-income families develop discipline, self-confidence and a standard of excellence that extends to all aspects of their lives. N3B committed funds to their Outreach In-school Program,



which provides innovative movementbased learning to hundreds of disadvantaged students in the Española area. The program will

culminate in May 2020 with a final performance for 4,500 audience members.

New Mexico Governor's STEM Challenge*

New Mexico Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham held the first-ever Governor's STEM Challenge in December to encourage high school students statewide to imagine, design and develop a project model that addressed the challenge of using technology to help ensure global safety. N3B was one of dozens of companies throughout the State of New Mexico that helped sponsor the event and provided prize money to schools and individual participants. N3B also supported the program through mentors and competition judges.



Northern New Mexico College

The President's Eagle Fund at Northern New Mexico College allows the president to designate resources to the areas of greatest need. The fund allows for purchases of classroom accessibility equipment to help ability-impaired students and the establishment of a campus food bank and clothing closet. Northern New Mexico College primarily serves Hispanic and Native American students and aims to be nationally recognized for cultural

sustainability, quality student learning and its ability to develop strong economic communities among diverse populations. N3B provided a substantial gift to help kick-start the fund.



Northern New Mexico Regional Arts Center

The Northern New Mexico Regional Arts Center — made up of artists, artisans and art aficionados in Española Valley — manages cultural events for the City of Española. It also manages the Española Community Arts Education Center where

it conducts music and art classes for the community, and it organizes and sponsors local art exhibitions. N3B's contribution will go toward a week-long summer arts and crafts workshop for children ages 6-12, predominantly from low-income families.



Ohkay Owingeh Housing Authority

The Ohkay Owingeh Housing Authority is committed to providing affordable, safe and healthy housing to Ohkay Owingeh tribal members while respecting tribal culture and traditions. N3B's contribution allowed the tribe to purchase new playground and picnic equipment at the Tsigo Bugeh Village Community Center, which creates a vibrant recreation space where children play and exercise while tribal elders socialize and strengthen family bonds.

Pajarito Environmental Education Center

The Pajarito Environmental Education Center is dedicated to sharing the nature of the Pajarito Plateau through its nature center; public programs such as talks, hikes, outings and classes; school lessons and field trips; and a state-of-the-art planetarium. N3B's donation will support transportation and resources for educational lessons to reach the underserved community of Los Luceros.



Rio Arriba Adult Literacy Program

The Rio Arriba Adult Literacy Program provides the only free, one-on-one adult literacy tutoring in the county. Their goal is to transform lives through enhanced literacy while reducing the number of Rio Arriba residents — currently 25 percent — who read below the sixth-grade level. Since social stigma and



inconvenience prevents many from seeking help and remaining in the program, N3B committed funds to recruitment and retention efforts. The program is committed to recruitment through outreach, and aims to ramp up retention efforts by upgrading electronic resources and providing childcare and transportation services.

Project Y – Team 4153

For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology, or FIRST, is an organization that helps high school students discover the rewards of engineering and science. It hosts several annual competitions, including the FIRST Robotics Competition, which Project Y-Team 4153, Los Alamos High School's FIRST Robotics Team, participates in. N3B donated money to assist with the purchase of robotics materials.

Santa Fe Alliance for Science

The Santa Fe Alliance for Science endeavors to inspire the inner scientist in Santa Fe students by creating STEM learning and discovery opportunities through their network of volunteer scientists, engineers and other STEM professionals. Each year they link about 100 professional scientists with the Santa Fe Public Schools to engage thousands of students in hands-on STEM activities. N3B

committed funds to the alliance's Adopt-A-School Program, which links a team of volunteers with an underserved school to provide STEM



support to students and teachers.

Santa Fe Youth Symphony Association

The Santa Fe Youth Symphony Association inspires and engages the youth of Northern New Mexico's multicultural communities through music education, performance opportunities and the guidance of music professionals. They strive to nurture lifelong passions for music-making and enhance the region's cultural atmosphere. To help maintain the association's trend of accepting all students regardless of financial need, N3B provided funds for tuition assistance for students in grades 2-6. Students enrolled in Santa Fe

Youth Symphony programs receive an instrument and a full year of programming on a sliding financial scale.



Self Help, Inc.

Self Help, Inc. assists people struggling with needs throughout Northern New Mexico. Clients who receive services include those faced with unforeseen medical or funeral expenses, victims of domestic violence, people with disabilities, single

parents or grandparents raising children on limited incomes and people seeking behavioral health treatment. N3B committed funds to the organization's Emergency Basic Need Grant Program, which provides for immediate



basic needs like medicine, emergency housing and utilities to families in Taos, Santa Fe, Rio Arriba and Los Alamos counties.

STEM Santa Fe

STEM Santa Fe aims to reduce disparity in educational opportunities by developing and providing Science, Technology, Engineering and Math programming,



mentoring and resources for youth - especially



those underrepresented in STEM fields. N3B donated funds to help STEM Santa Fe maintain its programs, which include hands-on workshops

with STEM professionals, a monthly program for girls in grade 5-8, a weekly mentorship program for high school students and one-day conferences and festivals.


United Way of Northern New Mexico






